Council President Oglesby reported the recent storms have blown sand from the lake down the street. Mr. Oglesby stated not only does Public Works spend a lot of time sweeping the sand back but spends a lot of money replenishing the sand lost. Mr. Oglesby suggested some type of barrier be place along the parking lot and the street.

Mayor Robbins suggested shrubs or tall grass to outline the parking lot. Mayor Robbins asked the Public Works Committee to reach out to Dave Winton, Public Works Department Head.

Mr. Oglesby asked are there any plans of opening the Public Works yard.

Mayor Robbins responded with the new executive order from Governor Murphy the Public Works yard will be opening on July 6th. Mayor Robbins stated Public Works will continue to pick up brush on Fridays, electronics on Wednesday, and be open the one Saturday a month.

Municipal Clerk Capasso asked does July 6th apply to all Borough buildings.

Mayor Robbins answered in the affirmative.

Councilman Lowe suggested the borough hall employees utilize the "old" violations office to collect payments.

COMMITTEE/COUNCIL REPORTS:

Councilwoman Hodges reported Public Works will be removing some of the Pear Trees along Union Avenue that are causing problems. Mrs. Hodges added several spots where the trees are located are also outlets adding if it is an outlet that the borough keeps, Public Works will place a planter over it and if it is an outlet that is removed, Public Works will concrete the area.

Council President Oglesby report the Personnel Committee will discuss the AFSCME contract during executive session.

Councilman McCarthy reported he attended the Board of Education meeting and added Board Member Dean Hetzel has resigned. Mr. McCarthy stated all appointments for contractual services for the 2020-2021 school year have been approved. Mr. McCarthy also stated the school superintendent received a bonus of \$3,587. Mr. McCarthy further stated bill payments for June 16th were \$304,875.84. Mr. McCarthy went on to say that five tuition free students were approved and added the tuition rate for non-resident students is \$4,000 a year. Mr. Oglesby asked was there a reason as to why the superintendent received a bonus.

Mr. McCarthy responded it is a performance-based incentive bonus adding she receives three of them annually.

Mr. McCarthy reported he received a low bid for the portable radios the Fire Department is requesting adding he and the Finance Committee will be setting up a meeting with the Chief Financial Officer once he receives the statues of the Fire Department's contribution.

Mr. McCarthy also reported the detention facility at the Police Department was inspected and is in full compliance. Mr. McCarthy stated the Police Records has moved over to the county records management system known as Spillman Records Management. Mr. McCarthy further stated this system is less expensive, it is maintained by the county, it frees up the officers due to the county dispatchers "plugging in" most of the information that the officers had to do, and to accommodate this systems, six printers were purchased for the police vehicles and added the printers were purchased with forfeiture money.

Mr. McCarthy stated the police department is looking for qualified lifeguards.

COMMENTS FROM PUBLIC:

Time opened: 7:56 pm

Bruce Margenson, 5 Geneva Road, asked what the bonus for school superintendent is based on adding a bonus is for a "job well done" and Lakehurst Elementary School is no longer number one.

Councilman McCarthy responded he does not know the parameter for the performancebased bonus and added it might not be made public. Mr. McCarthy stated that is a question for the Board of Education adding their meetings are the 2nd Tuesday of the month.

Mr. Margenson asked if the borough will be having National Night Out.

Municipal Clerk Capasso responded it is rescheduled for October 6th, 2020.

Mr. Margenson stated geese "droppings" are all along the shoreline.

Council President Oglesby responded experts say nothing you can do to the geese for a long time adding you have to keep changing it up. Mr. Oglesby also stated the borough has tried lights on the lake, dogs barking, bang pots, and "rattle" the eggs, nothing has worked.

Mayor Robbins stated Lake Horicon is a beautiful lake and wants everyone to enjoy it and added he will have Public Works Department Head investigate other options. Mr. Margenson stated at Barker's Village there are some low-income seniors living only on social security and added they are paying \$600 a month for pad rental. Mr. Margenson also stated the rent goes up every year with zero capital improvement. Mr. Margenson asked if the borough could help with rent control.

Mayor Robbins responded the borough could help if they had a housing authority.

Mr. Margenson stated the owner of Barker's Village receives money from the state due to Barker's Village claiming they are low-income housing.

Mayor Robbins responded borough attorney Ian Goldman will investigate if the borough can do anything legally.

Mr. Margenson also stated the dumpsters at Barker's Village use to have a fence around it to deter outsiders from dumping there and added the fence is no longer there.

Mrs. Capasso stated the code enforcement officer had issued a warning last week in regard to the fence. Mrs. Capasso also stated she will ask him on Tuesday when he is in if the time as lapse to replace the fence and added if it has, a ticket will be issued.

Mayor Robbins welcomed Bob Vosseller of the Manchester Times.

Mr. Vosseller stated he was happy to attend to the council meeting adding it is always a pleasure.
